#### **Print**

Thanks for using this Puppy Socialisation Passport from Dog Solutions.

Print the document off (take note of the page numbers). For best results, print on both sides of an A4 sheet of paper or card.

Fold the printed paper in half, and staple as needed.

Start by adding in a photo of your puppy and fill in the details on the entry page.

#### **Socialisation**

Socialisation is the process of exposing your puppy to a range of items, experiences and situations. Proper socialisation is essential to raising a confident, well-adjusted and social dog. All experiences in the critical periods of development will contribute to the dog your puppy grows into. You only get one chance at early socialisation, so make what you do now count.

Ensure that you are ticking as many things off the list as possible. You can add more in the notes area and we recommend adding details such as breeds of dogs encountered, or things like heavy vehicle if you are working on socialising to traffic. Make sure you do things that will be a normal part of your dog's life e.g. wearing a motorbike helmet if you ride.

Take toys, treats and a fun upbeat attitude. Start at low intensity (at a distance or low volume) and make it fun! Don't force it. Get closer or more intense only if puppy is comfortable. Increase intensity slowly and carefully as you do not want to scare the puppy. It is important not to frighten the puppy.

Dog to dog socialisation does not necessarily include a physical interaction. Just being able to see and smell the other dog can be beneficial. Be cautious around unknown dogs. A solid understanding of canine body language is recommended. See resources such as the dog decoder app in Google Play or the AppStore.
